June Valentine

Cowslip Primrose veris or vulgaris

Cowslip is one of the first spring flowering joys harking back to domesticated animal meadows, preferring open moist ground. Culpeper regularly recommended it for healing wounds, any spasms, gout and paralysis and mixed with nutmeg for "infirmities of the head". A spring ritual of collecting flowers for wine making, which was taken as a nervine and sedative. This is down to the salicylate constituent (as in aspirin). Modern agriculture practices have made Cowslip less widespread, but now cultivated from original yellow to many colours, which make it a showy ornamental. Good in borders and rock gardens and if divided after flowering, one can have many more or these cheery Cowslips.

Herb Conference Day Trips

The Day trips following the main event on the weekend of 8 and 9 October are aimed at HSOV members and allies, and our interstate/NZ herb society friends. Please joins us from Monday 10th October to Friday 14th October for a diverse look at gardens around Melbourne. There is bound to be something for everyone here and we hope you can join us for some or all of them. Even if you are unable to make the weekend event, feel free to join in. Here is an overview.

We have a couple of options, including a chartered bus trip. More to be revealed. **Royal Botanic Gardens – Melbourne**

We kick it off with a trip to our historic and much-loved gardens with a guided RBG walking tour of the gardens. The highlight will be a guided tour by Renee Wierzbicki, the curator of the Herb Garden, which HSOV volunteers played a large role in restoring. Renee has said there are recent plantings so even those who frequent often will see something new and exciting! We'll meet for lunch at the RBG Terrace by the lake between tours. These tours will be limited to 20 per session (up to 40 in total). After the formal tours, you may explore the many acres of gardens at your own pace. Cost: possibly a small fee for a guided tour; buy or bring your own lunch. www.rbg.vic.gov.au/melbourne-gardens



Weed Walk on Merri Creek Trail

A guided walk with HSOV member and Naturopath Jan Illingworth on the Merri Creek Trail, which is 15 min walk from Clifton Hill station, 7 km from the CBD. Identify and harvest weeds on the walk and learn how they are used for food and medicine. Depending on numbers, this may include a weed-based light lunch or teas. Cost: approx. \$20.

Royal Botanic Gardens - Cranbourne

Train and free bus transfer to the sister RBG Cranbourne gardens in the outer suburbs. Developed on 300 hectares of native bushland and a reclaimed quarry, the focus is on indigenous and native plants. Join the guided Australian Landscape Walk in the late morning, followed by lunch at Boon Wurrung Café in the gardens. Then explore the gardens before the bus transfer back to the station to train home. Cost: walk is \$15; buy/bring your own lunch.





Gardens at Heide Museum of Modern Arts

Heide was famous as an artist retreat, with a continuing artistic legacy. It is set among 15 acres of gardens in Bulleen and accessible by public transport. Come on guided walks with HSOV member Elsie Carter of the walled garden, original kitchen garden and the wild garden. HSOV volunteers were instrumental in saving and restoring these gardens in the 1980's with many of the ancient roses still thriving. Lunch at Heide Café, followed by a walk around the sculpture park or optional visit to the art galleries and exhibitions Cost: Gardens are free; Optional galleries around \$20; buy or bring your own lunch. www.heide.com.au

Annual General Meeting 2022

FIRST AND FINAL NOTICE

The 2022 Annual General Meeting of the Herb Society of Victoria Inc. will be held on **Thursday 3rd November at 7:30 pm** at Room MB10 Main Building, Burnley Horticultural Campus, 500 Yarra Blvd, Richmond.

The purpose of the Annual General Meeting is to attend to the business of the Society and the Annual Election of Officers and Committee Members as defined in the Rules 2014.

Our Rules 2014 allow for up to fifteen positions on the Committee of Management. All positions are declared vacant at the AGM. Nominations are called for the following positions:

- President
- Vice-President (2 positions)
- Committee Secretary
- Treasurer
- Membership Officer
- Editor and
- Up to seven other Committee members.

NOTE: Currently we do not have nominations for President, Vice-President, Editor and Secretary. We do need further nominations for Committee positions. A full complement of Committee members is important for the functioning of the Society and to provide services. It is also your chance to put your stamp on the future direction of the Herb Society of Victoria. The Herb Society seriously needs several more members to take on leadership positions within Committee.

Candidates, if unopposed, shall be declared elected at the Annual General Meeting. Where more candidates are nominated than required, voting shall be by secret ballot. Any member who is unable to attend the meeting may appoint any other financial member as proxy. The member appointing the proxy must notify the Committee Secretary (or President) in writing before the meeting. A Proxy Form is in this edition of THA.

The Committee meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month except December to organise General Meetings and other activities of the Society. Committee Meetings are conducted in a friendly atmosphere and kept as short as possible. They are either held in the same room as the general meetings that is MB10, Main Building, BURNLEY CAMPUS or via Zoom.

All financial members are eligible to attend the AGM and to stand for election to the Committee of Management. Nomination forms will be available on the night or complete the form in this issue. All new Committee members are very welcome.

The HSOV Financial documents for the Financial Year to June '22 are being published in this issue of The Herb Age and should enable you to understand the financial position of the Society. As a financial member you may ask questions at the AGM about financial matters or other issues that concern you.

Annual President Report

Ed note: In the absence of a standing President, here are some highlights from the year's previous President's reports from June Valentine (President to February 2022) and Mary Dawson (President March 2022 to August 2022).

We had typical Melbourne weather for the December 2021 meeting (4 seasons in one day) so attendance was lower than normal. However, those of us present enjoyed our picnic tea outside the student amenities building, and then adjourned inside for a good fun herb/spice quiz. It was our first in person meeting since May. Zoom has been an excellent second best.

The December AGM (delayed from November due to COVID restrictions) failed to attract a quorum of attendees and the committee voted on at the 2021 AGM continued to make interim decisions of behalf of the HSOV until the next AGM held in March. The HSOV held its AGM on March 3 and Mary Dawson was delighted to accept the nomination for President of the HSOV for 2022.

March also saw a special tribute to Jill's 'Life of Herbs' presented through a photographic onscreen montage, and by the many moving tributes and memories delivered by fellow members, it was quite a team effort. A strong theme that emerged from the tributes was that Jill 'has educated us all' not at all forgetting the public members of Victoria.

On Sunday March 27 a group of 30 members made their way on a perfect Autumn Day to Longacres, the much-loved country home and later permanent residence of the late Sir Arthur Streeton, one of Australia's great landscape painters. The magnificent garden was designed and planted by Streeton and as the last remaining property of the artist is of State historical significance. Our guided tour was a truly memorable experience.

Jan Illingworth delivered an in-depth presentation on 'Eat Your Weeds' in April. There was no lack of freshly plucked weeds to sample as Jan shared the history, harvest and medicinal/culinary uses of weeds oft described 'as a plant in the wrong place'. Following on from Jan's presentation a small group of members met up at the Labyrinth, located along the Merri Creek Trail, in Clifton Hall to join her on a Weed Walk.

In the May General Event June Valentine delivered a wealth of information in her presentation on the topic of 'Eucalyptus Oil'; one of the most versatile of all essential oils.

The HSOV recently celebrated its 42nd Birthday at the General Event in June. It was a very special occasion, not least, for the fact that social Birthday celebrations had not occurred due to Covid lockdowns in Victoria, since 2019! Members and Guests shared a beautiful supper together provided by the Committee with thanks to June Valentine for preparation and festive decoration and Marie Baker for the delicious cheeses. The supper followed on from a fascinating presentation by our Guest Speaker and HSOV member, Lesley Northey, on the topic of 'Japanese Herbs'. Lesley's knowledge of Japanese Herbs – and Spices – provided us all with an insightful education and burgeoning curiosity into the culinary, medicinal and historical aspects of the many fresh Japanese herbs from her own garden and local store-bought products.

Past Presidents Anne Makijani was Guest Speaker to the July General Event to present on the topic 'Gardens for Wildlife'. Anne is a community member with a strong commitment to nature conservation and biodiversity and is passionate about Gardens for Wildlife Victoria. Anne shared her rich knowledge and experience taking us through the Key Elements of improving habitat conservation in your garden.

The rules governing incorporations such as the HSOV, state we must hold our Annual General Meeting within 6 months of the end of financial year (ie by December). Previously that was not an issue, but last year was quite different.

Cast your mind back a year to September 2021. Melbourne was in lockdown; the Grand Final was in WA and HSOV meetings were held on zoom. The committee was faced with making difficult decisions on how and when to hold the AGM and ultimately chose to hold it as late as possible, at our first in person meeting in December 2021. After holding the AGM then, it was later found that we had not achieved a quorum of 20 members, as per the HSOV rules and a new notice of AGM was declared in the Feb/Mar 2022 Herb Age with the AGM held in March.

While, this may seem fairly simple to most members, behind the scenes the executive committee worked diligently to manage this very difficult situation, including many discussions with Consumer Affairs Victoria. It also required HOSV to make a late application, which (as I recall) carried a fee for the Society. We definitely do NOT want to see a repeat of this situation.

As members of HSOV, please ensure you attend the AGM meeting on November 3rd if possible. If you can't make it, try a proxy form, which is on the last page. Please be there, ready to vote or, even better, participate in the future of the HSOV by joining the committee.

Committee Roles

All positions are vacated each year and new nominations must be voted on at the Annual General Meeting. There are a few people leaving the committee this year and unfortunately, some also held multiple roles, which means there are several roles that currently don't have nominees for them at this year's AGM. Note, while Marie and Meridith are not renominating, they will continue to provide a service to the members in the Membership Officer and Editor roles, until replacements can be found. They are happy to be a mentor or assist whoever takes on the roles.

This means **lots of opportunities for fresh ideas that are open for all members**. Below is a brief overview of the roles, so please have a look and consider which one best suits you.

President Presides at the meetings of the Society and Committee.

Vice President (2 positions) Where the President is not available, the Vice President takes this role.

Secretary Keep the Society and Committee Meeting agendas, notices and minutes and deal with correspondences.

Editor Edits and arranges publication of the HSOV newsletter, The Herb Age.

Membership Officer Manages the register of Membership with additions or deletions and advising the Secretary.

Program Coordinator Arranges talks and presentations for our monthly general events **Website Manager** A new role for our AGM to manage the HSOV website with events and posts. The developing company is Melbourne based and happy to assist, as is Meridith who has been looking after the website and created a comprehensive instruction document.

These roles have nominees, but you may also add your name if you wish to hold this position.

Treasurer Responsible for HSOV financial incomings and outgoings, keeping the accounts and preparing financial reports for committee and the AGM.

Library Coordinator Maintains the library register of book purchases and loans to members. **Ordinary Committee** Conduct tasks on behalf of the society and represent members on the committee. You are most welcome to nominate and it's a great entry level to join the team.

Herbs in the Age newspaper





Book review Around the World in 80 Plants

Jonathon Drori has taken a trip around the world to find the most useful, unusual or poisonous plants (such as herbs on the ends of umbrellas to stab unsuspecting spies on Waterloo Bridge!). Interesting and amusing, there are comments like; fell out of favour until the plant was listed as an aphrodisiac and if it had a poison component, it seemed that many young men were the most affected. Loads of information with a deep dive into research on cultural, culinary, historic and medicinal uses. This follows his previous book of 80 trees.

Every plant is illustrated by Lucille Clerc, that while in the naive fashion, has all the details included from the text. It felt a bit like "Where's Wally" looking for those details. Many literates such as Monty Don, Dame Judy Dench, Bill Bryson and much praise from mainstream papers add to this book's must have. The details and wonderment of every plant make this a real page turner, just when one thought there was no more to know.
